FY Overview

We are now in the third year of SCTA being in existence and we are continuing to make strides to improve services in both the Reading and Lancaster areas. This year saw the completion of a combined Transit Development Plan that outlines service improvements for the next three to five years with a focus on providing access to jobs in Berks and Lancaster Counties. In particular, the area of the Turnpike and Route 222 being the main focus for providing service to meet the growing job market in that area. We held several public meetings during the development of the plan to ensure the needs of each community are being heard and were incorporated into the service recommendations. The entire report continues to be made available on the SCTA website.



This year there was also a focus on maintaining our assets as part of new federal requirements to protect the investment in vehicles,

equipment and facilities. We were able to complete the renovation of the Queen Street Station in Lancaster and start the expansion of the Reading Operations facility to enable the vehicle fleet to be protected under roof. The project is expected to be completed late summer of 2019. Other projects also include issuing a bid for the replacement of the roof at the BARTA Transportation Center (BTC) and the replacement and upgrade of parking equipment at the BTC and the Franklin Park-n-Transit Facility in Reading. We also continued our routine replacement of buses and paratransit vans with delivery of 12 new buses and 21 paratransit vans, plus another 29 buses on order for delivery FY 2019. All of these investments will help ensure that SCTA continues to provide reliable and cost effective services for the public.

For the upcoming year, SCTA will be focusing on complying with new federal requirements on safety and security. These new regulations will require SCTA to develop a comprehensive plan to address providing safe service for the public and on-going training for all employees. We will also be focusing on the need for funding, especially capital funding for our assets, as current funding legislation at the state level is in jeopardy and is due to expire.

As you can read, SCTA is continuing to move forward and make improvements to its services in order to provide the highest level and quality of service for all the citizens of Berks and Lancaster Counties.

August 2017 Service Changes

RRTA now has service to Shady Maple in Blue Ball, extending the **Route 12/New Holland** bus route. RRTA also modified the **Route 5/Grandview** route to serve the area of Lancaster City where the former Giant closed, allowing the residents to travel to the Giant on Lititz Pike. On both the **Route 14/Rockvale Square** and **Route 17/Columbia** bus routes, additional service was added to increase the frequency of trips.

BARTA and RRTA Offers 25 Cent Ride Promotion in Effort to Boost Ridership



Cent Rides on BARTA and RRTA for the entire month of October 2017. All bus routes on both systems allowed all customers to ride for just 25 cents a ride.
Prior to the start of the promotion, SCTA projected a 70(to 100(coincing ridership for each transit system).

In an effort to boost ridership, SCTA provided 25

7% to 10% gain in ridership for each transit system through the remainder of the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 for the promotion to be considered a success. The promotion ended up being moderately successful.

RRTA had provided the promotion almost ten years ago in an effort to boost ridership. At that time, **RRTA** saw a 37% increase in ridership during the month. BARTA saw a 28.81% increase in ridership compared to October 2016 ridership.

RRTA saw 12.94% increase compared to October 2016 rider-ship.

Transit Development Plan (TDP)

Throughout FY 17-18, The South Central Transit Authority (SCTA) completed the development of a Transit Development Plan (TDP) for the fixed-route bus and paratransit services in Berks and Lancaster Counties. The TDP will serve as a guide for meeting future demands for transit services and increasing the overall use of public transit.

Development of the TDP included:

- •Identifying demographics and travel trends
- •Evaluating current RRTA and BARTA service
- •Gathering input from riders and the public regarding existing services and future needs
- •Establishing goals and strategies to address unmet transit needs and services issues, such as connecting employees to their place of work
- •Identifying and evaluating opportunities for potential growth
- •Estimating the level of funding available to provide transit services over the life of the plan
- •Conducting a fare analysis

The Final TDP Report is available on the SCTA website for review. Recommendations in the report are suggested for over the next ten years with short term and long term improvements for consideration.

Transit Asset Management Plan

The SCTA Board adopted a Transit Asset Management Plan (TAM) that included 2019 performance goals as required by the FTA. The plan is also a requirement that ensures that all capital assets are being maintained and replaced in order for SCTA to reach a State of Good Repair. The Plan was also presented and adopted by both Berks and Lancaster Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO's).

Reaching Out to a Community in Need

When displaced families from Puerto Rico started coming to Pennsylvania because of the devastation from Hurricane Maria in Fall 2017, the Pennsylvania community wanted to help. The PA Dept. of State, PEMA/FEMA & the PA Governor's Advisory Commission of Latino Affairs created traveling resource fairs across the state to provide information and resources for displaced families trying to transition to living in a new location. SCTA staff participated in several of the events in Lancaster and Reading providing information about BARTA and RRTA transportation services. Our staff reached out to people of all ages and provided them with information about public transportation services and the programs to help with their transition.

Helping Showcase Lancaster City's History

As part of an effort by the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom, a program of the National Park Service/US Department of the Interior, SCTA allowed a historical display panel to be mounted on the wall beside the elevator entrance of the Queen Street Station Parking Garage. Queen Street Station Parking Garage, owned and operated by SCTA, is located on the corner of Queen & Chestnut Streets where the



former Lancaster railroad station was located. This new historical panel adds to other historical panels erected at Queen Street Station Parking Garage educating visitors about the significance of the corner of Queen & Chestnut Streets in the City of Lancaster.

Community Investment

SCTA is focused on the communities we serve by investing locally whenever possible to help our area thrive and grow. BARTA, RRTA and SCTA all make impactful investments in the local economy.
